SWIM, BIKE, RUN

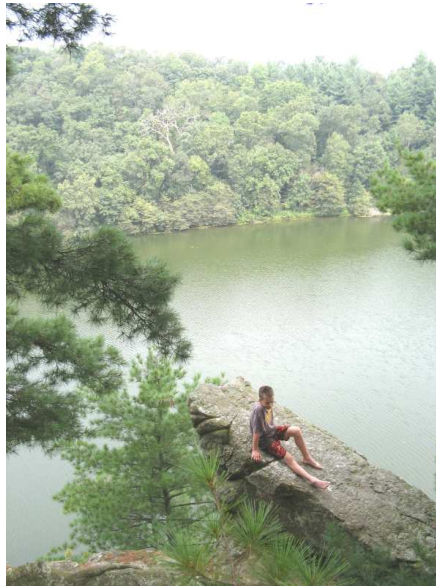


MS. DEAVEN IN THE WATER.
